Then, the lectures given in the conference, such as: "Those People are a Kind of Solution: Late Imperial Thoughts on Security and the Humanization of Officialdom" by Dr Mark Maguire was very interesting he was dealing with case study about terrorism, media and security by focusing on four witnesses and their reaction toward the terrorist attack of 09/11/2001 in USA. Another lecture entitled "After the "End of History": New Challenges for Social Sciences" by Dr Ladislav Cabada, he was discussing Fukuyama's theories in his book End of History, he applied them on the case of Czech Republic and xenophobia from migrants. In addition to the different discourses that raised about this issue. In the second day two other lectures were given, the first one is entitled "International Sociology Revisited: Towards New Directions" by Professor Sari Hanafi, he was discussing this topic using Max Weber's theories, he tackled several social aspects in relation to the international sociology. The second lecture is entitled "New Nationalisms, Migrations, and the Challenges to Democracy" by Professor Stefano Bianchini, he was dealing with migration policies in Italy and its effect on the democracy in the country. For me, two session were vey important, the session 2A, which was about "representations and observations of politics" and the session 5A, which was about "politics and inequality", the other sessions were also interesting but the mentioned two sessions are more relevant to my research topic. After every session a fruitful discussion took place after presentations and during the coffee break and the dinner time. About my presentation, I have presented about "women in political discourse in post-revolution Tunisia, (2011-2014)". The main research question is

“How do the dominant political discourses constructed in post-revolution Tunisia (2011-2014) have affected women’s representation in the legislative body? What are the main aspects of inclusion and exclusion of women in political discourses?”
